- Reading is a meaning making process so books for independent reading should be "just right", not too hard or not too easy. If your child can't read and understand most of what's on the page, save it for the future.
- Reading aloud to your children is an opportunity to enjoy some books that may be difficult to read alone. Reading to children builds background knowledge and vocabulary development. Besides, it's a great time to talk and cuddle with your child!

Anansi and the Talking Melon by Eric Kimmel 1994 Anansi, that clever spider, tricks elephant into thinking the melon he's hiding in can talk.

Arthur series by Marc Brown Enjoy the everyday and extraordinary situations of the loveable aardvark and his friends. Arthur chapter books, too.

Aunt Chip and the Triple Creek Dam Affair by Patricia Polacco 1996 How much TV is too much? The people of Triple Creek watch too much TV, so Aunt Chip shows them something better to do.

Chester's Way by Kevin Henkes 1988 Chester and Wilson are best friends, until Lily moves in.

Cloudy with a Chance of Meatballs by Judy Barrett 1978 The town of Chewandswallow has unusual weather that comes three times a day – at breakfast, lunch, and dinner.

Everything On It by Shel Silverstein 2011 Funny poems from the author of ***Where the Sidewalk Ends***.

Finding Winnie: The True Story of the World's Most Famous Bear by Lindsay Mattick 2016 Caldecott Read about Captain Harry Coleburn and the bear cub he rescued during WW1 who later became the inspiration for A.A. Milne's ***Winnie the Pooh***.

Jumanji by Chris Van Allsburg 1982 Caldecott Medal Some boys get more excitement than they expected when they find and play a mysterious jungle board game.

Just Ask by Sonia Sotomayor 2019 The Supreme Court Justice uses her own childhood experiences with diabetes to ask us to celebrate children with all sorts of challenges. As they build a community garden, the kids ask and answer questions. Readers are encouraged to do the same.

The Lorax by Dr. Seuss 1971 Dr. Seuss' cautionary tale about protecting the earth's natural beauty.
Miss Nelson is Missing! by Harry Allard 1977 The kids in Room 207 don't listen to their nice, sweet teacher Miss Nelson. But when Miss Viola Swamp substitutes, things change!

Miss Rumphius by Barbara Cooney 1982 Miss Rumphius wanted to travel, live by the sea, and make the world beautiful. Based on the real Lupine Lady whose seeds bloom along the coast of Maine.

The New Kid on the Block by Jack Prelutsky 1984 More than 100 hilarious poems to make you laugh.

Sofia Valdez, Future Prez by Andrea Beaty 2019 Sofi sees a problem and want to fix it! She plans to turn the landfill into a park, but City Hall says she's just a kid! Will this stop Sofi?

Strega Nona by Tomi de Paola 1976 Caldecott Honor Strega Nona's magical pot makes the best pasta. Big Anthony loves pasta but when he says the magic words the unexpected happens.

What Do You Do With a Problem? by Kobi Yamada 2016 A persistent problem faces a child but what can change a problem into an opportunity? From the author of ***What Can You Do With an Idea?***

Early Readers

Amelia Bedelia by Peggy Parish Enduring classic first published in 1963. Meet Amelia Bedelia, the unflappable maid who does everything she's asked, *literally!*

Annie and Snowball and the Book Bugs Club by Cynthia Rylant 2011 Annie and Henry join the library's summer reading club. Series

Bad Kitty by Nick Bruel 2005 Kitty's favorite foods are gone and all that's left are an alphabetical array of Asparagus, Beets, Cauliflower and 21 more, all unappealing. So, she misbehaves, alphabetically!

Charlie & Mouse by Laurel Snyder 2018 Geisel Award Charlie and Mouse, two silly brothers, talk to bed lumps, lead a neighborhood party, sell rocks, and invent new bedtime traditions.

Fox on the Job by James Marshall 1988 Fox wants to earn money, so he tries different jobs.

Frog and Toad Are Friends by Arnold Lobel 1971 Caldecott Honor This all-time favorite is about two best friends, Frog and Toad. Great series.

Henry and Mudge by Cynthia Rylant Henry is lonely, and he really wants a pet. So, his parents let him get a huge, loveable dog named Mudge. Popular series

King and Kayla and the Case of the Missing Dog Treats by Dori Hillestad Butler 2018 Geisel Honor Kayla made treats but 3 are missing. King *was* in the kitchen, but he didn't take them. Who did? Series

Ling & Ting: Twice as Silly by Grace Lin 2014 Identical twins Ling & Ting like to be silly, tell jokes and laugh together. Series

Little Bear by Else Holmelund Minarik A sweet story that will have young ones excited to find out what happens next. Classic series.

Mr. Putter and Tabby Walk the Dog by Cynthia Rylant 1994 When their neighbor hurts her foot Mr. Putter and his cat, Tabby, offer to help. What a nightmare! Series.

Nate the Great by Marjorie Weinman Sharmat 1977 Nate the Great is an extraordinary boy detective!

Penny and Her Marble by Kevin Henkes 2014 Geisel Honor Book Penny finds a beautiful marble on her neighbor's lawn and can't decide if it's ok to keep it. Also read ***Penny and Her Song*** 2012

Snail & Worm Again by Tina Kugler 2018 Geisel Honor book Good friends support each other in three funny stories.

Young Cam Jansen & The Lost Tooth by David Adler 1997 Cam's friend has lost a tooth in art class and to her dismay it disappears. Series

Chapter Books These books vary like readers do. Pick "just right" books for your child. Some children entering Gr. 2 can read them alone now, others will later this year. They're great to read aloud, too.

Bink and Gollie by Kate Di Camillo 2011 Geisel Award Three funny stories about two very good, but very different, friends.

Cam Jansen and the Mystery of the Stolen Diamonds by David Adler 2004 Can Cam's photographic memory help her catch a diamond thief? Series

The Chocolate Touch by Patrick Catling Reprint 2006 A boy who loves candy doesn't know what to do when everything he touches becomes chocolate

Flat Stanley by Jeff Brown 2013 50th Anniversary Reprint Stanley's an ordinary boy but a bulletin board flattens him. Now he can slide under doors, be a kite for his brother and more!

Get Ready for Second Grade, Amber Brown by Paula Danziger 2003 Amber Brown is ready for 2nd grade but a little nervous, too.

Gooney Bird Greene by Lois Lowry 2004 Gooney Bird loves being the "center of everything", and she tells the 2nd grade only "absolutely true stories". You'll love this modern day Pippi! Series

Ivy + Bean by Annie Barrows 2006 Bean and her new neighbor seem to have little in common but sometimes best friends come when you least expect it. Series

Teacher Troubles for Jelly Eli Z by David Adler 2018 Eli Zipperbaum is a good kid, but he doesn't always pay attention in class. But then something happens. Is he in trouble? Series

Magic Tree House series by Mary Pope Osborne Jack and his sister Annie discover a mysterious tree house packed with books. Soon they're traveling through time and space and having amazing adventures.

Mercy Watson Thinks Like a Pig by Kate DiCamillo 2008 Eugenia and Baby Lincoln live next door to a pig who loves the smell and taste of the flowers they've planted. Series

Owl Diaries: Eva's Treetop Festival by Rebecca Elliott 2015 Eva volunteers to organize a Spring Festival but it's a big job. Will she ask for help? Series
New! ***Unicorn Diaries: Bo's Magical New Friend*** Meet the Unicorns of Sparklegrove School! Series.

The Princess in Black by Shannon Hale 2014 Princess Magnolia has a secret —she's also the Princess in Black, and stopping monsters is the perfect job for her! Series

Ricky Ricotta's Mighty Robot by Dav Pilkey 2014 Ricky Ricotta makes an unlikely new friend.

Stink: The Incredible Shrinking Kid by Megan McDonald 2013 reprint Judy Moody's little brother has his own series. Meet Stink, the shortest kid in 2nd grade, in this first book

The Year of Billy Miller by Kevin Henkes 2014 Newbery Honor Book When 7-year-old Billy starts school with a bump on his head and a lot of worries he can't imagine just how great 2nd grade can be.

Non-fiction - There's lots more great nonfiction. Let your readers' interests guide choices.

All the Water in the World by George Ella Lyon 2001 Lyrical verse explores and informs about the water cycle. Beautiful illustrations.

The Brain is Kind of a Big Deal by Nick Seluk 2019 Do you know what your brain does? This book will give you the facts and lots of fun. Like this? Then read ***The Sun is Kind of a Big Deal***, too.

Fly Guy Presents Dinosaurs by Tedd Arnold 2014 Fly Guy and Buzz Boy visit a natural history museum to learn about dinosaurs. Check out other Fly Guy informational books, too.

If You Decide to Go to the Moon by Faith McNulty 2005 Go with a boy on a trip to the moon. What will you pack? What will the trip be like?

Jane Goodall: Friend of the Apes by Mary Lindeen 2009 Read about the scientist's work with gorillas.

How Much Is a Million? by David M. Schwartz & Steven Kellogg 2004 See how big a bowl you'd need to hold a million goldfish, or how many years it takes to count to a million.

Ivan: The Remarkable True Story of the Shopping Mall Gorilla by Katherine Applegate 2014. This picture book tells the true story of Ivan, the shopping mall gorilla that inspired the 2013 Newbery Medal novel, *The One and Only Ivan*.

Monarch Butterflies by Gail Gibbons 1989 Learn what Monarchs look like and about its life cycle. Great nonfiction author for kids. Some others by the author: ***Snakes; Lizards; Frogs; From Seed to Plant***

Packard Takes Flight: A Bird's-Eye View of Columbus by Susan Levine 2010 After falling from his nest atop The Rhodes Tower, Packard, a baby peregrine falcon, must find his way back home. On his trip he visits the sights of Columbus! Get some great ideas for day trips around town!

A Picture Book of Jackie Robinson by David A. Adler 1997 A look at the life of baseball great Jackie Robinson. Adler explores others famous people in this series, too.

Train by Elisha Cooper 2013 Learn about life on the rails as you travel the country. There's the commuter, passenger, freight, overnight trains and more.

Who is/ Was.. series by various authors Readable biographies from Johnny Appleseed to Steve Jobs that really engage children.
